B. INTRODUCTION:

As an oral health care provider and educator, the dental hygiene practitioner must have a comprehensive and practical understanding of the products and procedures required to design and provide evidence based client centered oral health care plan. This course provides the future dental hygienist with the knowledge and skill required to successfully assess the client needs, choose the ideal product, educate and guide the client in their individual oral self-care regime.

In this course the student will be able to *explain the application of preventive methods and measures* in relation to oral health, as an intermediate step towards the mastery of competency 00LJ *educating* preventive measures in relation to oral health.

The student will demonstrate this competency while linking skills and knowledge from the following competencies: The following program competencies will be further developed:

00L7 Apply standard precautions.

00L8 Apply health and safety measures.

00L9 Perform administrative tasks in relation to job environment.

00LC Detect oral diseases.

00LE Be able to communicate in a professional manner with the client and the work team.

00LF Establish connections between nutrition and oral health.

00LG Develop a preventive treatment plan.

00LJ Educate the client preventive measures in relation to oral health.

00LQ Intervene in the area of preventive dental health.

This course incorporates evidence-based practice: an approach where clinical expertise is blended with the highest quality research while taking into account the client's needs and preferences. The students will use evidence-based practice in all aspects of the course.
